Background:

In 2001, Toronto City Council adopted the Toronto Bike Plan. This Plan calls for the creation of a comprehensive Bikeway Network throughout the city, and includes the introduction of bicycle lanes on Lansdowne Avenue from Bloor Street to Davenport Road.

The cross section drawing on the reverse of this notice illustrates a 12.4m midblock cross section, typical to this part of Lansdowne Ave. The most significant change associated with the proposed addition of bicycle lanes would be the reduction of traffic lanes from two in each direction, to one in each direction. There would also be a reduction of parking, and left turn lanes are proposed in this design at the traffic signals.


Parking that is now permitted on both sides of the street in the rush our times, would be restricted to one side of the street but would be available all the times.

Next Steps:

Following this consultation, City Staff will review any comments received. We plan to submit this project for consideration to Public Work and Infrastructure Committee (PWIC) meeting on April 20, 2010. We anticipate the Lansdowne Avenue bike lane project will be considered by City council on May 11-13, 2010.

If approved, bike lanes on Lansdowne Avenue are planned to be installed in summer 2010.
